

Information accessible for the insurance industry

COUNTRY	INFORMATION ACCESSIBLE
Belgium	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- no direct access to police information and no formal exchange of information, but looking into formalizing their exchange of information from private to public- insurers can register stolen vehicles on a daily basis on a database hold by Datassur (separate legal entity). DB are accessible for auto crime police forces- direct access to registration data of vehicles
Denmark	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- direct access to registration data
France	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- no direct access to the Police data- access to data on stolen and claimed vehicles through ARGOS (private association funded by insurance companies)
Finland	<ul style="list-style-type: none">- direct access to the database of The Finnish Vehicle Administration AKE- information about stolen vehicles available online- Schengen wanted vehicles available via AKE's database

Germany	<p>GDV</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - direct access to the data of the <i>Bundeskriminalamt</i> regarding vehicles stolen in Germany, <u>but</u>: information can only be disclosed to the police not to third parties. - access to insurance data base regarding stolen and total loss vehicles, but information is only for insurance companies and the police - Role of GDV is to bring together the parties involved to make possible the necessary exchange of information.
Italy	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - free online Minister of Interior database on stolen vehicles. - Schengen and Interpol ASF are provided by this databank. - Association has its own claims db, but not quite well updated on stolen vehicles data. - currently in discussion with INTERPOL in order to find an agreement about the exchange of data - the registration data is public and easy accessible by payment

The Netherlands	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - direct access to registration data of vehicles - access to EUCARIS - photographs of damaged and wrecked vehicles can be obtained - direct access to the police data for vehicles - information from the NCB - own DB, info shared with the police (upon request) - LIV is a national center with registration officers, police and insurance bureau for vehicle crime
Norway	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - the information is mostly public as in Sweden - the same information as in Sweden can be received
Sweden	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - most of the information is accessible for the private sector, except health : - information can be given on: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • insurance • stolen vehicles on a daily basis (information received on a daily basis from the police) • registration data
United Kingdom	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - a database of stolen/wrecked vehicles exists since the end of the 1980s - no direct access to the registration data - existing claims data base
